this book in two volumes breathes fresh air empirically methodologically and theoretically into understanding the rich ceremonial lives the philosophical religious knowledge and the impressive material feats and labor organization that distinguish hopewell indians of central ohio and neighboring regions during the first centuries ce the first volume defines cross culturally for the first time the ritual drama as a genre of social performance it reconstructs and compares parts

of 14 such dramas that hopewellian and other woodland period peoples performed in their ceremonial centers to help the soul like essences of their deceased make the journey to an afterlife the second volume builds and critiques ten formal cross cultural models of personhood and the self and infers the nature of scioto hopewell people's ontology two facets of their ontology are found to have been instrumental in their creating the intercommunity alliances and cooperation and gathering the labor required to construct their huge multicomunity ceremonial centers a relational collective concept of the self defined by the ethical quality of the relationships one has with other beings and a concept of multiple soul like essences that compose a human being and can be harnessed strategically to create familial like ethical bonds of cooperation among individuals and communities the archaeological reconstructions of hopewellian ritual dramas and concepts of personhood and the self and of hopewell people's strategic uses of these are informed by three large surveys of historic woodland and plains indians narratives ideas and rites about journeys to afterlives the creatures who inhabit the cosmos and the nature and functions of soul like essences coupled with rich contextual archaeological and bioarchaeological taphonomic analyses the bioarchaeological taphonomic method of *l'anthropologie de terrain* new to north american archaeology is introduced and applied in all the research in this book vitalizes a vision of an anthropology committed to native logic and motivation and skeptical of the imposition of western world views and categories onto native peoples

everyday lives are the product of brain mechanisms that evolved to protect us from harm the prevalence rate of psychiatric symptoms in the u s general population how religious and other beliefs influence the brain mechanisms that underlie psychiatric symptoms and the brain regions that are involved in different psychiatric disorders part iv presents the findings of u s studies demonstrating that positive beliefs about god and life after death and belief in meaning in life and divine forgiveness have salutary associations with mental health whereas negative beliefs about god and life after death belief in the devil and human evil and doubts about one s religious beliefs have pernicious associations with mental health the last part of the book summarizes each section and recommends research on the brain mechanism underlying psychiatric symptoms and the relationships among these brain mechanisms religious beliefs and mental health in the context of etas theory

how did the belief in resurrection become part of the symbolic construction of early jewish and christian communities why was it a marker for who did or did not belong in certain groups using insights from the social sciences and rhetorical studies the author discusses the development of belief in resurrection in early jewish circles and the growth of a resurrection apologetic in early christianity examining materials on the pharisees jewish liturgy and the earliest rabbinic statements as well as the theology of resurrection in paul justin athenagoras irenaeus and tertullian this study demonstrates the stability of certain tenets that coalesce around the concept of resurrection and its utility as a shorthand for a community s theology and self understanding

food has played a major role in funerary and memorial practices since the dawn of the human race in the ancient roman world for example it was common practice to build channels from the tops of graves into the crypts themselves and mourners would regularly pour offerings of food and drink into these conduits to nourish the dead while they waited for the afterlife funeral cookies wrapped with printed prayers and poems meant to comfort mourners became popular in victorian england while in china japan and korea it is customary to offer food not only to the bereaved but to the deceased with ritual dishes prepared and served to the dead dying to eat is the first interdisciplinary book to examine the role of food in death bereavement and the afterlife the contributors explore the phenomenon across cultures and religions investigating topics including tombstone rituals in buddhism catholicism and shamanism the role of death in the moroccan approach to food and the role of funeral casseroles and church cookbooks in the southern united states this innovative collection not only offers food for thought regarding the theories and methods behind these practices but also provides recipes that allow the reader to connect to the argument through material experience illuminating how cooking and corpses both transform and construct social rituals dying to eat serves as a
